A BIBLE STUDY OF THE NINTH (OR TENTH) COMMANDMENT

How to count the Ten Commandments correctly is subject to debate. Sometimes Exodus 20:3 (no other gods) and 20:4 (do not worship images of false gods) are counted as one commandment because they are so similar. Sometimes they are counted as two separate commandments. In most cases, verse 20:17 is counted as one commandment but Martin Luther counted this verse as two separate commandments. Depending upon how you count them, there are nine, ten or eleven commandments. How we count the commandments is not important, however, what is important is whether we follow them. This week's Bible Study looks at the last of the commandments (#9 or #10) and seeks to understand what coveting is and how we should respond to a modern consumer culture that wants us to covet more and more.

Exodus 20:17 (NIV)

¹⁷You shall not covet your neighbor's house. You shall not covet your neighbor's wife, or his male or female servant, his ox or donkey, or anything that belongs to your neighbor."

Luther's **SHORTER CATECHISM** – The Ninth and Tenth Commandments

9TH COMMANDMENT: You shall not covet your neighbor's house.

What is this? or What does this mean?

We are to fear and love God, so that we do not try to trick our neighbors out of their inheritance or property or try to get it for ourselves by claiming to have a legal right to it and the like, but instead be of help and service to them in keeping what is theirs.

10TH COMMANDMENT: You shall not covet your neighbor's wife, or male or female slave, or ox, or donkey, or anything that belongs to your neighbor.

What is this? or What does this mean?

We are to fear and love God, so that we do not entice, force, or steal away from our neighbors their spouses, household workers, or livestock, but instead urge them to stay and fulfill their responsibilities to our neighbors.

The Hebrew text of Exodus 20:17 tells us we must not "covet" our "neighbor's house," "wife," "slaves," livestock, or "anything that belongs" to them. We noted in our study of the seventh commandment (26 August) how the Bible affirms the concept of private property. The original version of this commandment viewed wives and slaves as a man's property. The Biblical writers of that time may have thought they understood God correctly, but if we take Genesis 1:27 seriously, its teaching that God created "humankind, male and female, in his image," means women and other human beings cannot be a man's property. A better translation of this verse might be "You shall not covet your neighbor's spouse (not wife), household workers (not slaves or servants), livestock or any property that belongs to your neighbor."

In Martin Luther's **Shorter Catechism**, we see how Martin Luther, even in the 16th century, figured out that the original Exodus text reflected an earlier era that was not in tune with what this commandment really said, namely that we must not covet our neighbors' "<u>spouses</u>, <u>household workers</u> and livestock."

With an understanding that this commandment applies equally to all men and women, we can focus on what it says. The key word in this verse is usually translated as "*covet*." It means to desire, want, or take pleasure in something (Exodus 34:24, Isaiah 44:9). The following two verses may help us understand "*covet*":

Job 20:20: **Because he knew no contentment in his belly**; he will not let anything in which he <u>delights (covets)</u> escape him.

Micah 2:2: They <u>covet</u> fields and seize them, and houses, and take them. They defraud people of their homes, they rob them of their inheritance.

Coveting starts out as a simple desire, wanting something we do not have. In Job, coveting comes from not being satisfied with what we have ("no contentment"). In Micah, coveting the property of others leads to stealing their property (fraud and robbery). Desiring someone's spouse or property can lead to taking what they have. This commandment urges us to treasure or value what we already have and to control our thoughts about wanting more (self-control, see 1 Corinthians 7:5).

Today we live in a time when popular consumer culture is based on enticing us to covet all kinds of things. We are deluged with television, print and electronic advertising that urges us to want more and more. What does this commandment say about how we should respond to this commercial culture? We've already noted how it commands us to practice self-control and not covet what we do not need. Luther's **Shorter Catechism** suggests another way to respond. We should join with our neighbors in respecting each other's families and property while "fulfilling our responsibilities to our neighbors" by helping those in need. Coveting or desiring our neighbors' welfare is pleasing to God.
